Cell phones and PDA's can be consolidated into one unit. This combination of equipment is also an MP3 music player and a digital camera.

Remember your walkman that allowed you to take your music with you? Now you can also take video programs such as TV shows and movies with you on portable players and on your cell phone. In the upcoming year, we are going to see even more devices that communicate over the Internet using your home wireless network. Show Office Assistant at Startup

Applies to: Access, Outlook, PowerPoint, Word & Excel

1. Open a Microsoft Office program
2. If the Office Assistant is not displayed, **Click Show the Office Assistant** on the **Help** menu
3. Right-click the Office Assistant
4. Click **Options**
5. On the **Options** tab, select the **Show the Tip of the Day at startup** check box

Q: My cursor is too small—how can I make it bigger?

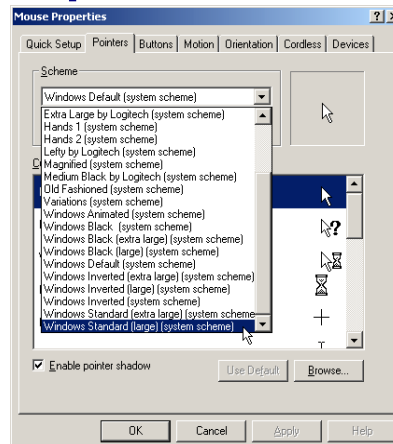
A: You can select a larger cursor scheme

from your Mouse Properties. Here's how:

1. Hit the **Start** button, **Settings**, **Control Panel**.
2. Open your **Mouse** icon, then go to the **Pointers** tab.
3. From here, you should see a drop box labeled **"Scheme."** You're looking for an item labeled either:

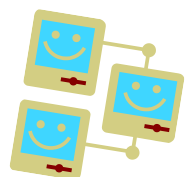
Windows Standard (extra large) (system scheme) OR

Windows Standard (large) (system scheme)



Either one of those will give you a larger than standard mouse cursor. Depending on the computer and version of Windows, you may find you have a lot of other options, too. Check 'em out, you may find you like certain cursor schemes better than others.

Vice Presidents Message

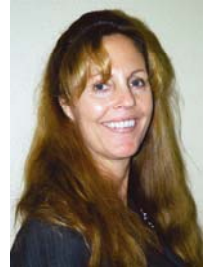
To Our Clients:

Invasion of the Bots

December 2004 was the time of year where you started seeing statistics for various things that happened throughout the past 12 months. One that grabbed everyone's attention was the skyrocketing growth in Bots (PC's that are controlled by hackers using a worm or Trojan with a backdoor), and skyrocketing may be too subtle of a word.

According to Symantec, there has been a 450% increase in virus attacks on Windows machines this year, and the reason for this shocking rise in attacks is the product of hackers using automation to find vulnerable machines. The major component in these automated attacks is the increasingly popular backdoor element that is written into the viruses. This allows the hacker to take control of your PC and use it to his/her bidding, like trying to infect other machines or mass mailing.

Something that is gaining popularity among these ambitious hackers has been to manage all of their captive PC's like one big network. This gives the hacker not only limitless processing power but makes it almost impossible for authorities to track down the culprit. Not to mention malicious acts could be preformed from your PC without your knowledge and possibly even causing you to be accused of ill deeds. In addition to automation being directly responsible for the sharp increase in infected PC's it has also caused a 100% increase in the amount of phishing sites. Which, if you remember, is when a site will spoof a legitimate site in order to trick you into giving up sensitive information such as credit card numbers and account information. Hackers are even renting or selling these annexed networks to other criminals to carry out their illegal acts.

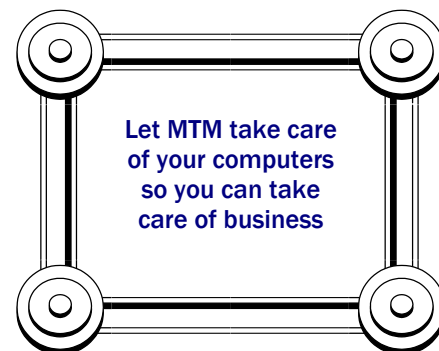
A test done by marketing communications firm Avant-Garde in which they put a number of different systems in a "Honey Pot" situation, with a number of different configurations from XP SP1 and [SP2](#), with and without firewalls, and even other OS's like Mac OS X, and Linux. With a broadband connection the Windows XP SP1 configured machine with no firewall was taken over and controlled in 30 seconds. On average it took about 4 minutes for a hacker to take control of one of these PC's, but the systems with [firewalls](#) were for the most part left alone for easier prey.

In order to lower your chances of being infected make sure you have all your software up-to-date, [antivirus software](#) installed, and a [firewall](#). One thing to keep in mind is that most firewalls have some sort of log that has the ip address of everything coming into or out of your PC. ***No one is completely immune to viruses regardless of whatever defensive measures you may have in place, which means you have to watch your step and take responsibility for your own online safety.***

Important Tip

Keep a watch out for people standing near you in the checkout line at retail stores, restaurants, grocery stores, etc. who have a camera cell phone in hand. With the camera cell phones, they can take a picture of your credit card, which gives them your name, number and expiration date. CBS reported this type of identification theft is one of the fastest growing scams today. Be aware of your surroundings.

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The Ten Commandments of Computing

1. Backup.
2. Backup – Never backup over your most recent backup. Have several generations of backup disks or tapes and backup over the oldest of them.
3. Backup – Backup to removable media and remove that media from your place of business (have some type of offsite backup in case of theft, fire or other act of God). Should be done once per week.
4. Backup – Verify that you are in fact getting a good backup. Setup a test where you restore some data just to make sure that you can.
5. Protect your computer from Viruses – Update your Antivirus software every two years.
6. Protect your computer from Viruses – Make sure that your virus definition files (A.K.A. Signature files) are updated each week.
7. Protect your computer from Viruses – Make sure that your antivirus software is set to check your e-mail (check under program “Options”).
8. Protect your computer from Hackers (or Whackers) – If you have an “always on” connection to the Internet, you should have a Firewall (software, hardware or both).
9. Protect your computer from Hackers – Download and install security updates monthly. Windows users use “Windows Update” and Microsoft Outlook users use “Office Update” as well.
10. Do NOT contribute to the problem of SPAM.

Protect Your Computer Against Power Surges

A good Uninterrupted Power Supply, or UPS as they’re commonly called, contains surge protection AND battery backup within one unit. These devices provide just what the name states and a bit more.

The surge protection portion of the unit assists in protecting your system by maintaining constant flow during voltage surges. The backup portion of the unit provides you with battery-supplied power when the AC power fails. Usually one side of the unit is surge protection only, which you plug your non-critical items into, such as printers, scanners, etc. The other side is surge protection and battery backup. You want to get your tower or desktop and monitor into these outlets to ensure your tools are available if you’re on battery to close out and shut down properly.

Depending on your specific operations, the types and costs for UPS units can vary. For many users, the “5-minute UPS” will be sufficient. The battery charges itself while plugged into the AC outlet. Basically, when the power goes off, the UPS carries the computer operations for 5 minutes allowing you to save your information and shut down your system properly, instead of just a cold power out. If you’re not around, provided hardware and software allows you to configure your system for a safe shutdown.

You can of course purchase UPS units which provide a longer battery life if you may have further to go to get to the system, or more time is needed to close applications, ext. For office

environments, protecting the Server is especially critical, but don’t forget about the networked workstations as they can also be zapped.

Remember though more expensive and advanced UPS units can protect your computer against more surges, realize that if your office or home is struck by lightning, many of your market place UPS systems will be unable to handle that voltage.

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
